## Top facility opens

They may be under lock and key, but Wairoa's stray canines are now enjoying all the benefits of a posh pound.

The new facility opened this month and is already housing a steady stream of wandering hounds. Capable of accommodating up to 21 dogs, the large facility allows the WDC Animal Control Team to provide a higher standard of care for their charges.

Officer Harry Te Rangi says the improved conditions make the job a lot easier and more pleasant for all

concerned.

"The new facility is much easier to clean, and there is plenty of room for each dog to be housed separately. Before, we were having to pair dogs up based on temperament, which was always a difficult thing to judge. Now, it's a lot safer for the dogs," he said.

## Emergency eruption plan

Recent activity on Mount Tongariro and Mount Ruapehu serves as a timely reminder to think about how you would respond to a volcanic eruption.

### Before a volcanic eruption:

- Monitor the volcanic risk in your community.
- People with respiratory health issues should consider where they could go to gain respite.
- Develop a Household and Business Emergency Plan. Assemble and maintain your Emergency Survival Items for your home as well as a portable getaway kit.
- Consider how you would operate with restrictions, eg electricity/transport.
- Include your pets and livestock in your emergency plan.

### If volcanic ash comes our way:

- Listen to your local radio stations as emergency management officials will be broadcasting the most appropriate advice for your

community and situation.

- Put your emergency plan into action if advised to do so.
- If you have a disability or need assistance, make contact with your support network and monitor civil defence advice.
- Put machinery inside a garage or shed, or cover with large tarpaulins to protect from volcanic ash.
- Bring animals into closed shelters to protect them from volcanic ash.
- Protect sensitive electronics and do not uncover until the environment is totally ash-free.
- Water supplies can be affected so it is a good idea to store drinking water in containers and fill bathtubs and sinks with water. Disconnect down pipes if on rainwater supply.
- Check on friends and neighbours.

## Solo certificate gained

Pete has achieved the NZQA National Certificate in

Water Treatment (level 4), which means he can fly solo in the production of the town's water supply.

Having worked at the plant for the past four years, he is well-versed in what it takes to keep the operation flowing, although up until now this has meant working under the supervision of Plant Manager

Morgan Goldsmith.

The hefty responsibility of ensuring that the 8 to 14 million litres of water passing through the plant daily is of the highest standard is not taken lightly. "It means a lot to have the ticket to



carry out the work on my own, particularly with all the new technology we've been introducing such as the UV reactors," he said. Rather than settle for the Certificate, Pete is continuing his education by turning his attention to achieving a Diploma in Water Treatment, which will expand his capabilities even more.
