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From the Mayor.....



We are coming to the end of the year and I just wanted to take this opportunity to encourage you all to enjoy the summer months and to be safe

during the holiday season. It has been very busy at Council with the end of year rush and getting ready for the festive season.

By now you will all know about the by-election and that nominations are now open for candidates who wish to be nominated to fill the vacancy that currently exists on Council. People have been asking me, what qualifications and skills do I need to be on Council. I think at the very least, you must have a deep commitment to our community, be ready to serve our people and be ready to work for what is in the best interest of Wairoa. Nominations close on the 22nd of December, just before Christmas, with voting papers coming out at the end of January.

I've also been getting a lot of questions about the Local Government Commission's position paper on Hawke's Bay reorganisation. The Commission has revised its proposal and has requested additional financial information from Councils. Once it receives this information, it will release its position on ring-fencing debt, which became an issue over the last couple of months; this will hopefully be released in February 2015.

The Commission has also introduced an additional step to

the process. A survey will be done in the first quarter of 2015 to test the support for the Commission's revised position, and it is absolutely critical that the people of Wairoa participate in this process. Once this step is complete, the Commission will decide whether to issue a final proposal or to leave things as they are. The process has become drawn out and continues to be frustrating, the position paper paints a very bleak future for Wairoa which I completely reject and I again ask the people of Wairoa to get involved, have conversations about the impact of amalgamation, let's make sure that the Local Government Commission hears loud and clear the views of the people of Wairoa.

I'm so pleased to see that Kiwirail has offered a lease of the Napier to Gisborne rail corridor to the Hawke's Bay Regional Council. I was pleased to have hosted the Mayors of our region to bring to bear the full force of a unified voice in calling for this lease. I know that re-opening the rail corridor will bring benefit to our community. Not only for the potential uses of the corridor, but imagine what that might mean in terms of releasing the pressure on our roads by heavy trucks. Not only does that mean driving from Napier to Wairoa and through to Gisborne will be that little bit less stressful, but keeping our roads from the everyday wear and tear from heavy vehicles, the savings to Wairoa for road maintenance would be an added bonus. All of this when taken together can only mean good news for Wairoa.

We continue to work hard in the best interest of Wairoa. Enjoy the summer months, be safe over the holiday season, and take care of each other.

Nominations are still open for the vacancy that exists on Council and will close on 22 December. Due to council offices being closed from 20 December, nomination forms can be dropped off at the Wairoa Public Library during Council's close down period. Each nomination must be accompanied by a deposit of \$200 GST inclusive (payable by cash or cheque).

Electoral Roll

The electoral roll to be used for this by-election closes on Monday 22 December 2014 and can be inspected during normal business hours from Monday 24 November 2014 at the Council offices.

Fire Bans



The Wairoa District Council wants you to be safe over the summer period, and with the typical balmy summers we usually get, it's that time of year to be aware of the status of fire bans. When a restricted fire season is in place,

permits are required to light an open air fire. Examples include incinerating rubbish, hangi or barbeque fires, or vegetation burn-offs. Permits are free, with three days' notice required and can be obtained from the Council offices. When a Total Fire Ban is in place, under no circumstances can an open air fire be lit. Signs will be updated when the fire ban status changes. Also check local media.

Freedom Camping

Wairoa welcomes freedom campers to our district. We hope campers park up, take a break and enjoy Wairoa. There are designated freedom camping sites within the Wairoa township and Mahia Peninsula. Freedom campers are reminded to make sure they are aware of the location of these sights and the conditions of their

use.



Camping on Council-owned land outside of these freedom camping locations is not permitted and you will be directed to the nearest registered camping ground or freedom camping site. Information about freedom camping is available for download from the Wairoa District Council website.

Liquor Bans



Are you aware of the areas around our district where alcohol bans are in place? The Wairoa District Council wants you to celebrate with friends and family over the holiday season, but be aware that full liquor bans will be in place. To encourage a safe and welcoming

environment in our public places there are alcohol bans in certain areas of Wairoa and the entire Mahia Peninsula.

These include:

WAIROA (24 hours per day 365 days of the year) bounded by:

- Marine Parade from Murrae Street to King Street.
- Queen Street from Murrae Street to King Street.
- Riverbank from Murrae Street to King Street.
- And all associated alleys and car parks.

MAHIA (24 hours a day from December 20th to January 20th every year):

The whole of the Mahia Peninsula and surrounding area

Dog leashing and registration

Wairoa District Council reminds you to keep dogs on a lead at all times in public places. The council also ask that all dogs are registered by 3 months of age, and new puppies must be micro chipped within 2 months of registration. Get the forms from the Wairoa District Council offices on Queen street.
