MAJOR MAHIA ROADING **BOOST**

It is so encouraging to see our district and our people being invested in.

On Tuesday, Parliamentary Under-Secretary for Regional Economic Development, Fletcher Tabuteau. announced an \$8.3 million Central Government investment for Mahia

The announcement was held at Tuahuru Marae amongst a crowd of local people who I know were thrilled to have their local roading

network and connectivity prioritised.

I would like to acknowledge Rongomaiwahine and the work of Rongomaiwahine Iwi Trust Chief Executive Moana Rongo and the Mahia Maori Committee for their ability to see the bigger picture around this roading project. We are also very appreciative of the wonderful hospitality at Tuahuru on Tuesday.

The funding will improve the Mahia East Coast Road and Nuhaka/ Opoutama roads, both of which are in need of urgent remedial work.

These roads are critical to the community, visitors and businesses on Mahia Peninsula and the upgrade will increase confidence in the long-term accessibility of the Mahia area.

THE \$8.3 MILLION WILL BE USED TO:

- · Traction seal and work on 12.5km of road on the Mahia East Coast Road including 4km of road on Onenui Station that leads to the Rocket Lab site (\$7 million)
- Apply a second coat of traction seal to Mahia East Coast Road (\$1 million), and
- Investigate realigning the 11.3 km Nuhaka-Opoutama Road (\$300,000).

The Mahia East Coast road upgrade will also allow Rocket Lab to transport equipment to their complex so they can develop and operate a second launch site.

Investing in roading infrastructure adds to the district's regional economic development and has benefits for the wider community, visitors and local businesses.

Again, we are appreciative of this Coalition Government and the fact it recognises the extra value external funding can have on a region's economic growth.

Through the Provincial Growth Fund our district has received

investments of more than \$30 million.

This money has come to us because our people have demonstrated a need and the positive outcomes this investment will create.

There has been no impact on our local ratepayers.

Figures have shown traffic numbers to Mahia increased from 17,000 over the 2018/2019 summer period to 49,000 over the 2019/2020 summer period so there is plenty of pressure on the infrastructure.

Mahia based historian Bill Shortt told me the Waikokopu dropout (Blowhole) and the area around it was problematic over 60-years

The slip, which occurred in the late 1950s, was one of the largest in New Zealand, and right up there with the Manawatu Gorge slip of a few years ago.

The \$300,000 will support investigations to look at all the options for access into the Peninsula, as well as the realignment of the Nuhaka/Opoutama Road.

This road is an 11.3km sealed road with dropout areas, including the Blowhole, of over 1.7km caused by coastal erosion. The funding will investigate alternative routes to bypass these dropouts with a new route critical to ensuring certainty of access.

The investigation will include assessing all relevant options to realign the road and include designs, consultation, and Geotech reports to produce a document that provides sufficient detail to assess funding options.

Thank you to everyone for your continued patience while we work to find long-term solutions that are sustainable for future generations, particularly for areas like the Blowhole.

We know these issues have been around for a long, long time and it is great to be part of a Council that is working with a Government that is finally realising the benefits and potential its investment can

We will continue to work with the Government to achieve as much as we possibly can to grow economic development in our district.

We also remain committed to advocating for improvements and sealing of sections on SH 38. I know there is frustration from our community over the state of this national highway and we will continue to lobby to have the unsealed sections of road improved.

I know there are other individuals and organisations looking for Government assistance. I encourage anyone who has an idea that will help boost Wairoa to make an application through the Provincial Growth Fund.
