SUCCESS THROUGH RESILIENCE

Wairoa and its people are resilient. We know that, and a recent measure of New Zealand's resilience through COVID-19 places Wairoa as a top performer.

Research firm Dot Loves Data, identified business resilience was strongest in Gisborne, Wairoa and Opotiki, which was underpinned by reasonable net business growth, fewer business closures and more stable consumer demand.

The fact that Amber has even been selected to compete against big city salons is testimony to the successful way she runs her business.

I know there is a huge amount of work and strict criteria to even make it as a finalist, particularly as this is a significant year as it celebrates the 50th jubilee of the New Zealand Association of Registered Beauty Professionals.

The awards evening will be held in Auckland in June. Over the next couple of months, Amber and the other finalists will be rolling out a social media programme promoting themselves and showing how they interact and engage with their community.

Beauty Antix also recently achieved Platinum status from skin care expert Dermalogica. The Wairoa salon was one of 17 Dermalogica clients across New Zealand to reach this level.
