ANNUAL PLAN


We are seeking feedback on this year's Annual Plan with submissions closing on June 5. Thank you to those people who attended our hybrid community meeting last week. It's always refreshing to hear the thoughts of community members.

This year we are particularly interested in hearing your input around requests for additional funding from the Wairoa Community Centre and Wairoa Museum. If Council continues to fund these two vital community assets at the same level as we currently are, the rates increase would remain at an average increase of about 8.2%, as indicated in the 2021-31 Long-Term Plan.

If you would like Council to increase funding to both these important community facilities, in line with their increased costs, this could result in a total average rate increase of 1.3% on top of the forecasted 8.2% average rates, so an average increase of 9.5%. Don't forget you don't have to support any increase, or you may want to only support an increase for one of these community assets, which would increase rates by around 0.65%.

This will show your current property valuation along with your current rates and the forecasted rates.



I encourage people to check out their forecasted rates as there will be impacts from last year's Wairoa District Rating Revaluation which was carried out by Quotable Value.

MAYORAL COLUMN

This will particularly impact on properties that had high capital value increases. As a general guide, the change from the rate spread of last year is residential houses revalued at \$400,000 and under have the highest significant rates increase, commercial properties have a decrease, farming has an increase and forestry has a decrease.

We need to hear if you are happy with this proposed spread of rates, or would you like to see the differentials adjusted to change to a similar rate spread as last year, a different type of spread or as per the current proposal. Should the valuation bands for residential rating units be adjusted to keep pace with valuations?

Please remember, we are not mind readers, everyone will have different thoughts based on how their property is impacted, we need to hear from you so your community voice can guide us and so we can use the tools we have developed to try and keep rates affordable across the district.

If you are planning a catch up with one of Wairoa District Council's Building Inspectors, please make an appointment first.

In the past Council has been flexible around casual drop-ins from members of the public needing to talk with a Building Inspector. Now, to create efficiencies and improve time management, appointments will need to be made.

Booking appointments allows Council staff to prepare any necessary information in advance and should streamline projects. Previously staff have worked with clients who have just called into the Council offices, but this casual approach is not an efficient use of Council staff or members of the public's time.

I know booking appointments will mean people will have to be a little bit more organised, but really this is no different to making an appointment for any other specialised service.
