I am working with the Ministry of Disabled People Whaikaha very closely, they have taken this very seriously and I am confident with their support, we will come up with a long-term solution for Gavin and our community.

The TVNZ news piece with John Campbell was exceptional and resulted in nationwide exposure and messages from many people across New Zealand who are supporting our journey.

Unfortunately, Gavin is the face of Wairoa's erosion of services. We need parity and we need to be able to provide Wairoa-based support for everyone in our

I urge the providers of the Glengarry rest home to please do everything they can to repair the facility or set up a temporary facility. People like Gavin and our Glengarry rest home residents who were also shipped out of town, need to be bought back to Wairoa, back to their home, and be assured they will receive the level of care they need. It is heart breaking that we have local people who are being forced to live away from their home, and away from their whānau. I will continue to advocate strongly for our community. I believe I am making some traction, but if we cannot find a way forward very soon, then we need to meet as a community to see how we can do this together and discuss the erosion of localism issues we are experiencing.

### **VICIOUS ATTACK**

My heart goes out to the local elderly man who was the victim of a home invasion. What happened to him was appalling. To wake up and find someone at the end of your bed and then be attacked is incredibly frightening. He was seriously assaulted and was hospitalised as a result. I visited him at his home, he is a very brave and resilient man and has been overwhelmed with the support he has received from local people. If anyone knows who carried out this cowardly attack please contact the Police, this is really not the Wairoa way.

Our Wairoa Recovery team, led by Recovery Manager Benita Tahuri, is making inroads on progressing the rebuild of our town and district.

A co-ordinated approach to silt removal is being trialled and the team is putting in processes for things like asbestos management, how to apply for Red Cross funding and general inquiries.

Some of the work that is being rolled out is using learnings from the Edgecumbe flooding in 2017, but there are also a lot of issues that relate directly to Wairoa's experience.

We have a long road of recovery ahead of us, but we are making progress. Already around 12,000 tonnes of silt has been stockpiled with much more silt removal needed, especially from under houses.

The Recovery Team is now channelling all its requests through the Wairoa District Council Customer Service Requests (CSR) system to hopefully meet people's needs in the most efficient way possible by having all requests going to one centralised point.
