How quickly will stop banks be repaired?

There was major damage to the region's flood infrastructure which will take time to fully repair.

Rapid damage assessments have been completed and breaches have been mapped. Stop banks have been damaged on the Ngaruroro, Tukituki and Tūtaekurī rivers, and some pumping stations on streams and drains were flooded and stopped operating.

The immediate focus for the Regional Council is doing everything we can to prepare stop banks for future rain events. Staff are also reinstating the region's flood warning system and repairing pump stations.

We have 13 Rapid Repair teams working at pace on the breaches and we have bunds (temporary replacement stop banks) in place. We are moving onto more permanent repairs.

Why did the stop bank damage occur?

The amount of runoff resulting from high intensity rainfall exceeded the level of service (protection) provided by both the Heretaunga and Upper Tukituki Flood control schemes. Rainfall intensities in many locations exceeded a 1-in-500 return period.

The floodwater caused 30 breaches in our stop banks, equalling about 6km of our 248km network. Important to note: the stop banks did not burst their flood banks. Stop banks were overtopped and this led to erosion because of the large volume of water moving at speed - a number of breaches developed where the stop bank was washed away. In some places, built up tree material on bridges led to stop banks overtopping.

We had started to lift flood protection on the Heretaunga Plains scheme from 1-in-100 year flood levels to 1-in-500 year levels. The Taradale stop bank upgrade completed late last year was instrumental in protecting much of Napier from catastrophic flooding, so we know these upgrades are vital.

What are the best ways to get help in rural areas?

Recovery grants

How are we helping farmers and orchardists clear damage?

We are mindful of the pressure many landowners in our region are under and we are in close contact with all agencies involved in the recovery to best support our communities. Landowners can contact the Regional Council for advice and assistance.

Silt removal: If you have silt waste on a lifestyle block, farm or orchard, the Regional Council will be able to help you remove larger volumes. These landowners are asked to remove the silt from around vines or trees and move it to one location on their own property with access for trucks. **PLEASE NOTE:** the Regional Council does not coordinate residential silt removal. EQC have advice on dealing with residential silt here **hbrc.info/EQCFactsheet**

Wood waste: If you have wood waste on a lifestyle block, farm or orchard, the Regional Council will be able to help you remove larger volumes. Landowners are asked to move the wood waste to a location on their property with suitable access for trucks.

Posts and wire: Where landowners have large quantities of posts and wire from fences, such as viticulture and horticulture operations, these can be collected by the Regional Council.

PLEASE NOTE: Tanalised posts and wire that make up this waste should not be burned. But un-tanilised timber can be piled up, and when dry it can be burned.

Household goods: Disposal of flood damaged household goods is through local councils - people can check their local council website or phone them for the latest advice.

Ponding: Landowners with ponding water still on their land can contact us for advice and assistance.
